As we said last year, while it's true that the government is looking to reduce the growth of future spending, the Affordable Care Act does not eliminate \$500 billion out of the current budget for Medicare. Most important, there are no cuts to guaranteed Medicare benefits.

That brings us to our ruling. Generally, we'd give this a "Mostly False" given that there is a small kernel of truth to the statement. But we also have a policy of taking into account whether the speaker is willfully repeating something we've said wasn't true before -- and in this case we have said it several times.

 National Right to Life "lauded the vote" by the Republican National Convention's platform committee to leave out exceptions for rape and incest:

Cases of rape and incest or in which the mother's life is in danger are not addressed in the platform, which implies there are no exceptions in those cases.

The National Right to Life Committee, an anti-abortion group, lauded the vote and declared the GOP "the party of life."

"The language adopted today makes a strong stand supporting the most vulnerable members of our society," said National Right to Life president Carol Tobias, in a statement. "We applaud the Republican Party and the dedicated members of the platform committee for reaffirming and renewing their efforts on behalf of mothers and their unborn children."

 The National Right to Life even published a "how-to" guide for defending this position, which labels women as the "aggressor" if they choose to terminate a pregnancy resulting from acts of rape or incest.

But while society is finally recognizing that rape is an act of violence against an innocent victim, it still fails to recognize that abortion is also an act of violence against another innocent victim.

If the woman does become pregnant, a rare but possible occurrence, she may be made to feel twice as tainted when society is not prepared to cope with the circumstances of this child's conception.

Irrationally, society expects her to kill her unborn child, not for something the child has done, but for the crime of his/her father. Once again the mother is pitted against her child.

Subjecting her to an abortion only compounds the initial violence of the rape. Only in this second tragedy, the woman becomes the aggressor against her own child.

Understandably, there is concern about the violence of rape or incest, but at best that fear leads to a misplaced sense of chivalry, at worst a coldhearted rejection of both victims of the crime.

While hard cases can make bad law, they can also offer the greatest challenge to create the kind of life-affirming society we want to live in.

Efforts are underway to repeal the health care law, which takes important steps to improve women's health.

o Under the health care law, all new health plans must

cover preventive health services such as mammograms and pap tests, at no cost to the woman.

Beginning this year, most new health plans will also have to provide additional preventive services that are important to women at no out-of-pocket cost. These include the full range of FDA-approved methods of contraception, an annual well-woman visit, screening for gestational diabetes, screening and counseling for sexually transmitted infections, screening for domestic violence, and breastfeeding support, supplies, and counseling.
